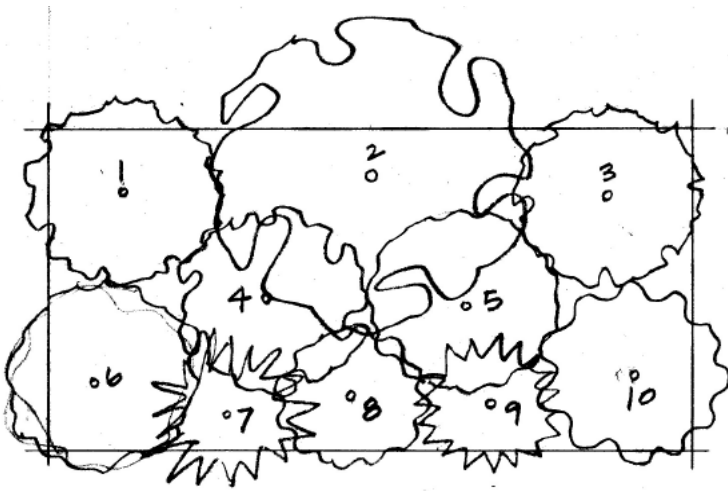

Cacti and succulents will thrive as long as they have very good drainage. Too much water can be a killer.

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WATERWISE GARDENING

What a challenge it is to garden here in north Texas. Our soils are not always the best, we have extremes in temperatures and rainfall and water is becoming a precious resource. Our climate is such that we can spend a good portion of the year outdoors. So we still want beautiful outdoor living spaces that are easy to maintain and do not use a lot of water. It is possible to have it all!

Turf requires more water than other plants

Select varieties that are not as thirsty. Mow regularly at the correct height. Or...do you need it all? Could there be more beds under the trees? Could you use stones for pathways? What about raised beds for vegetable gardening?

Trees provide shade for your plants and your home

They lower house and soil temperatures and help prevent moisture loss.

Choose plants that work such as native and well-adapted plants that, once established, require minimal amounts of water

And did you know that herbs such as rosemary, thyme and sage are very drought-tolerant?

Prepare the soil with lots of compost and other organic matter

This will help you grow healthier plants and water will go down to plant roots rather than run off.

Mulch!

A 3-inch layer of mulch keeps plants moist, controls weed growth and protects plants against severe temperature swings.

Water plants only when necessary

New plantings will need more the first year or two. Established plantings should not need more than one inch of water a week. Rain counts! Water deeply to encourage deep roots. Inspect irrigation system on a regular basis.
